Done

with the racism, and sexism, and all the isms and prisons that bind us, that blind us from the hurt of another.

I want to be done,

with addiction, with any affliction that takes a hold and won't let go, and speaks in lies and fiction.

> I want to be done, with the things that divide us instead of unite us, like the walls we build, the hate instilled, we fill with judgement inside us.

I want to be done, done with violence, and the silence when facing injustice, but I wonder if you'd trust us if love was our compass.

SOON, when we come together, when WE stand up for each other, we WILL offer these hands and feet and BE love, compassion and grace; come heaven to earth, oh Thy (we) will be DONE.

TEXTS & TRANSLATIONS (CONT.)

UNTIL LOVE IS SPOKEN

Grant us gentleness in power. Grant us strength to face this hour, to forgive, to offer grace, and nurture peace in every place.

Grant us hope when all seems dire. Grant us faith to spark a fire, to fiercely burn, to drown the night, and set the world ablaze with light.

And when we meet resistance and our call puts us in danger, grant us patience and persistence to stand up for friend and stranger.

Grant us courage to be kind. Grant us singleness of mind to free the world from hate and fear, so only love is spoken here.

And when our path of justice leads us to the dreadful fight, grant us vigor, and entrust us with the power to do what's right.

LET THERE BE PEACE ON EARTH

Let there be peace on earth and let it begin with me; let there be peace on earth, the peace that was meant to be. With God our creator, children all are we. Let us walk with each other in perfect harmony.

With every step I take, may this be my solemn vow: To take each moment and live each moment in peace eternally. Let there be peace on earth, and let it begin with me.

PROGRAM NOTES

The Magnificat text is rich and historic, and though it's an unwritten rule, it seems each composer get one chance to declare what they believe the text means to them. Is it possible to capture the sound of Mary going from typical teenage child to God's chosen one? Is it feasible to spend five movements cycling through all of the emotions the story elicits? What helps narrate and what seems overly dramatic? As I approached the text, the following became my interpretation:

Magnificat anima mea

Joy, honor, and bewilderment. A child-like exclamation at the beginning yields to a warm melody by measure 28, where the men begin singing of God's regard for Mary's lowly status. A murky section afterward leans on the word anima, which is feminine and means "breath", "air", or "life force." Before returning to joy, we have incredibly stately chords as the choir sings about what mighty work God has done through Mary.

Shall I Rejoice

To add a modern voice, I asked Dr. Terry York to write a new text, and his words connected with me deeply. There is a musical simplicity to this movement, but the piece builds around Dr. York's text as he very uniquely channels Mary's intuition to foreshadow the trouble ahead for her son. That uncertainty peaks as the words "joy and agony" sound like they unravel. Still, every phrase ends with release and determination.

Deposuit

A solo violin becomes Mary's character, and you can hear the uncertainty in her voice. The violin is minor, it's questioning, it's fearful. And the text from the choir is about fearing God, who will show strength, and scatter the proud and arrogant. The movement ends with and unexpected peace, as the violin represents Mary's understanding of what this means.

Et misericordia

Movements three and four are very much linked. The sixteenth notes remain, but their hurried sound turns major as the choir sings about God exalting the humble and feeding the hungry, leaving behind the fearful nature of the previous movement.

Gloria Patri

The final movement begins with jubilation: *Gloria Patri ("*Glory be to the Father"), the choir sings, as the accompaniment sells "As it was in the beginning" is the translation, as the choir then sings a gentle, simple melody. The Latin word semper seems to go in circles about halfway through, as it means "always". A slowed down version of the opening melody is sung by a soloist in an ethereal way, before the choir energetically closes by singing about what this means for "generations of generations."

CONDUCTOR & ACCOMPANISTS

DR. H. MORRIS STEVENS, JR-CONDUCTOR

Dr. H. Morris Stevens, Jr., is the Director of Music Ministry at St. Theresa Catholic Church in Austin, Texas. In May 2020, he retired from St. Edward's University where he served for 13 years as Head of the Music Department. While at St. Edward's University, he founded the Masterworks Project, which became a leading Community Outreach Music program consisting of a large Chorus and full Orchestra. During those 13 years, the Masterworks Singers toured every two years, and gave concerts in such countries as Ireland, Scotland, Spain, Portugal, Denmark, Sweden, Norway, Lithuania, Latvia, Estonia and Finland.

Dr. Stevens is recognized as a clinician/conductor of Honor Choirs in many states and adjudicates choral competitions nationally. Throughout his career he has commissioned many new choral works from outstanding composers. The Masterworks Singers have so far, commissioned four major works with the support of the Edward D. Anderson Fund.

Dr. Stevens is most proud of his wonderful family, his wife Polly, his children, Sarah, Patrick and Rebekah, their wonderful spouses, and his six grandchildren, Ruaridh, Evie, Birdie, Margot, Murray & Ruby Dru.

SUSAN NEFF, PIANIST

Susan Neff spent 32 years in the music/choral classroom retiring from public school teaching in 2014. Her next three years she accompanied choirs in various school districts and supervised music student teachers at the University of Texas. She returned to the private school classroom for 3 years as the choral/piano teacher at Hyde Park High School. She now continues to accompany and consult for school choir programs. She is also a pianist for the 9am choir at St. Theresa Catholic Church in Austin, Tx. She lives in Pflugerville where she loves spending time with her grown sons David and Mark, daughter in law Lindsey, and special Mimi time with her grandson Dylan.

MARK STERN, ORGANIST

Mark Stern is a native Austinite and has lived in Central Texas his whole life. He joined the Masterworks Singers in the Fall of 2016 and has been a tenor in the group ever since. He has a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology, with a minor in Music, and a Master of Arts in Psychological Research. During his undergraduate education, Mark studied organ with Dr. John Schmidt and is currently studying organ privately with Dr. Eun Joo Fierro.

Mark is Assistant Professor of Instruction in the Department of Psychology at Texas State University and teaches a variety of classes, particularly in the cognitive psychology field. In addition to his work at Texas State, Mark is the Organist at The Church at Highland Park & Associate Organist at St. Theresa Catholic Church.
